## Transport Requirements

1. All dogs must be quarantined away from the shelter/animal control facility for 14 days in a Foster Home, Quarantine facility, veterinarian's office or kennel prior to transport. This allows for vaccines to be effective and any contagious illness that may have been contracted to be treated before transport.
2. All dogs must have an Interstate Health Certificate issued from a veterinarian licensed by the state where the dog is boarding our transport. This is a requirement of the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA). The health certificate must have been issued within 10 days from the date of your pup's transport date. This ensures that the pup is healthy and up to date on his/hers vaccines. The health certificate must have the name and address of the person adopting or fostering the pup.
3. All dogs must have Medical Records that indicate current vaccines and fecal history. All dogs must have had Bordetella to prevent Kennel Cough 14 days prior to transport. All vaccines must be up to date...at least 2-DA2PPC and Rabies and be clearly marked on paperwork. Negative fecal for coccidia, giardia and worms is required prior to transport.
4. All dogs are required to be on some type of flea/tick prevention. If we see fleas or ticks your dog will not be allowed to board transport.
5. Any pregnant dog must have documentation indicating due date. We cannot transport if due date is within two (2) weeks of transport.
6. We do not transport puppies younger than 10 weeks old. Their immune system is not developed enough for the health risk.
7. We will not transport any dog that has been diagnosed with a contagious health condition that has not been treated and cured. Example is Kennel Cough, intestinal parasites, or sarcoptic mange. If cured, we need a written statement from a veterinarian that the dog is no longer contagious. You probably won't be able to get a health certificate if one of these diseases are present.
8. If possible, your dog should be wearing some kind of identification. This should include his/her phone number of the new adopter, foster, or rescue. Also include where the dog is coming from. The temporary collars provided by veterinarians work great. Please make sure the adopter, foster or rescue bring a collar and lead to take their new pup home.
9. If your dog has been spayed or neutered in the last five (5) days, please wait for next transport. This is for the welfare of the dog.
10. If your dog might travel better with their favorite toy or blanket, please bring it along. Please have the adopter remind the driver to give it to them. This includes X-rays and medications.
11. It is our priority to get your pup to his/her forever home safely, healthy and quickly as possible. We ask that you adhere to these requirements to ensure this.
